<p><b>Adult Companion.</b> In-home services to insure the safety and well-being of a person who cannot be left alone because of frail health, a tendency to wander, inability to respond to emergency situations, or other conditions that would require a person on-site. The service provider may provide voice cueing and occasional assistance with toileting, personal hygiene, dressing, and other activities of daily living. However, the major responsibility is to provide companionship and be there in case they are needed.</p>	<p><b>No Changes</b></p>
<p><b>Adult Day Care.</b> Adult Day Care is a supervised, structured day program, outside the home of the participant that offer one (1) or more of a variety of social, recreational, health activities, supervision for safety, and assistance with activities of daily living. These activities need to be identified on the plan of service. Adult Day Care cannot exceed thirty (30) hours per week either alone or in combination with developmental therapy, occupational therapy, or IBI.</p> <p>a. Services provided in a facility must meet the building and health standards identified in IDAPA 16.03.21, “Developmental Disabilities Agencies (DDA).”</p> <p>b. Services provided in a home must meet the standards of home certification identified in IDAPA 16.03.19, “Rules Governing Certified Family Home,” and health standards identified in IDAPA 16.03.21, “Developmental Disabilities Agencies (DDA).”</p>	<p><b>Adult Day Health.</b> Adult Day Health is a supervised, structured day program, outside the home of the participant that offers one (1) or more of a variety of social, recreational, health activities, supervision for safety, and assistance with activities of daily living. Adult Day Health cannot exceed thirty (30) hours per week either alone or in combination with developmental therapy, occupational therapy.</p>
<p><b>Adult Day Care.</b> Adult day care is a supervised, structured day program, outside the home of the participant, that may offer one (1) or more of a variety of social, recreational, health activities, supervision for safety, and assistance with activities of daily living.</p>	<p><b>Adult Day Health.</b> Adult day care is a supervised, structured day program, outside the home of the participant, that may offer one (1) or more of a variety of social, recreational, health activities, supervision for safety, and assistance with activities of daily living. Adult Day Health cannot exceed twelve (12) hours per day.</p>

**Adult Residential Care Services.** Services are those that consist of a range of services provided in a congregate setting licensed in accordance with IDAPA 16.03.22, "Residential Care or Assisted Living Facilities in Idaho," that includes: (3-19-07)

- a. Medication management;
- b. Assistance with activities of daily living;
- c. Meals, including special diets;
- d. Housekeeping;
- e. Laundry;
- f. Transportation;
- g. Opportunities for socialization;
- h. Recreation; and
- i. Assistance with personal finances.
- j. Administrative oversight must be provided for all services provided or available in this setting.
- k. A written individual service plan must be negotiated between the participant or his legal representative, and a facility representative.

**Adult Residential Care Services.**

1. Services include those that consist of a range of services provided in a congregate setting licensed in accordance with IDAPA 16.03.22, "Residential Care or Assisted Living Facilities in Idaho," that includes:

- a. Medication management;
- b. Assistance with activities of daily living;
- c. Meals, including special diets;
- d. Housekeeping;
- e. Laundry;
- f. Transportation;
- g. Opportunities for socialization;
- h. Recreation; and
- i. Assistance with personal finances.
- j. Administrative oversight must be provided for all services provided or available in this setting.
- k. A written individual service plan must be negotiated between the participant or his legal representative, and a facility representative.

2. Services also include those that consist of a range of services provided in a setting licensed in accordance with IDAPA 16.03.19, "Rules Governing Certified Family Homes," that includes:

- a. Medication management;
- b. Assistance with activities of daily living;
- c. Meals, including special diets;
- d. Housekeeping;
- e. Laundry;
- f. Transportation;
- g. Recreation; and
- h. Assistance with personal finances.
- i. Administrative oversight must be provided for all services provided or available in this setting.
- j. A written individual service plan must be negotiated between the participant or his legal representative, and a facility representative.

<p><b>Attendant Care.</b> Attendant care services are those services that involve personal and medically oriented tasks dealing with the functional needs of the participant. These services may include personal care and medical tasks that can be done by unlicensed persons, or delegated to an unlicensed person by a licensed health care professional. Services may occur in the participant's home, community, work, school or recreational settings.</p> <p>a. To utilize the services of a Personal Assistance Agency acting as a fiscal intermediary, the participant family, or legal representative must be able and willing to assume responsibility for the direction of the participant's care and for personnel activities such as provider selection and supervision. If the participant, family, or legal representative is unable or unwilling to assume such responsibility, then an agency employee must be utilized.</p> <p>b. The Department may require supervision by a health care professional if the required care is so complex that such supervision is necessary for health and safety.</p>	<p><b>No Changes</b></p>
<p><b>Behavior Consultation/Crisis Management.</b> Behavior Consultation/Crisis Management services which provide direct consultation and clinical evaluation of participants who are currently experiencing or may be expected to experience, a psychological, behavioral, or emotional crisis. This service may provide training and staff development related to the needs of a participant. These services also provide emergency back-up involving the direct support of the participant in crisis.</p>	<p><b>No Changes</b></p>
<p><b>Behavior Consultation or Crisis Management.</b> Behavior consultation or crisis management consists of services that provide direct consultation and clinical evaluation of participants who are currently experiencing, or are expected to experience, a psychological, behavioral, or emotional crisis. This service may provide training and staff development related to the needs of a participant. These services also include emergency back-up that provides direct support and services to a participant in crisis.</p>	<p>N/A/ - service will be removed as it was not used.</p>
<p><b>Chore Services.</b> Chore services which are heavy household maintenance and minor home repairs necessary to maintain the functional use of the home and to provide a clean, sanitary and safe environment. Chore activities include washing windows; moving heavy furniture and shoveling snow to provide safe access inside and outside the home; chopping wood when wood is the participant's primary source of heat; and tacking down loose rugs and flooring. These services are only available when neither the participant, nor anyone else in the household is capable of performing or financially providing for them, and where no other relative, caretaker, landlord, community volunteer/agency or third party payer is capable of or responsible</p>	<p><b>Chore Services.</b> Chore services include the following services when necessary to maintain the functional use of the home, or to provide a clean, sanitary and safe environment:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>a. <p><b>Consultation.</b> Consultation services are services to a participant or family member. Services provided by a PAA to a participant or family member to increase their skills as an employer or manager of their own care. Such services are directed at achieving the highest level of independence and self reliance possible for the participant/family. Services to the provider are for the purpose of understanding the special needs of the participant and the role of the care giver.</p>	<p><b>Consultation.</b> Consultation services are services to a participant or family member. Services are provided by a Personal Assistance Agency to a participant or family member to increase their skills as an employer or manager of their own care. Such services are directed at achieving the highest level of independence and self reliance possible for the participant/family. Services include consulting with the participant and/or family to gain a better understanding of the special needs of the participant and the role of the care giver. Consultation services include the development of the plan of care.</p>
<p><b>Environmental Accessibility Adaptations.</b> Environmental accessibility adaptations which are those interior or exterior physical adaptations to the home, required by the waiver participant's plan of service, which are necessary to ensure the health, welfare, safety of the individual, or which enable the individual to function with greater independence in the home and without which, the waiver participant would require institutionalization. Such adaptations may include the installation of ramps and lifts, widening of doorways, modification of bathroom facilities, or installation of electric and plumbing systems which are necessary to accommodate the medical equipment and supplies necessary for the welfare of the waiver participant, but must exclude those adaptations or improvements to the home which are not of direct medical or remedial benefit to the participant, such as carpeting, roof repair, or central air conditioning. All services must be provided in accordance with applicable State or local building codes. Permanent environmental modifications are limited to modifications to a home rented or owned by the participant or the participant's family when the home is the participant's principal residence. Portable or non-stationary modifications may be made when such modifications can follow the participant to his next place of residence or be returned to the Department.</p>	<p><b>Home Modifications.</b> Minor housing adaptations that are necessary to enable the participant to function with greater independence in the home, or without which, the participant would require institutionalization. Such adaptations may include:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>a. The installation of ramps and lifts, widening of doorways, modification of bathroom facilities, or installation of electric and plumbing systems which are necessary to accommodate the medical equipment and supplies necessary for the welfare of the waiver participant, but will exclude those adaptations or improvements to the home which are not of direct medical or remedial benefit to the participant, such as carpeting, roof repair, or central air conditioning.</li> <li>b. <p><b>Home Delivered Meals.</b> Home delivered meals which are designed to promote adequate waiver participant nutrition through the provision and home delivery of one (1) to two (2) meals per day. Home delivered meals are limited to participants who rent or own their own home, who are alone for significant parts of the day and have no regular caretaker for extended periods of time.</p>	<p><b>Home Delivered Meals.</b> Meals which are designed to promote adequate participant nutrition through the provision and home delivery of one (1) to two (2) meals per day. Home delivered meals are limited to participants who:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>a. Rent or own their own home;</li> <li>b. Are alone for significant parts of the day;</li> <li>c. <p><b>Homemaker Services.</b> Assistance to the participant with light housekeeping, laundry, assistance with essential errands, meal preparation, and other light housekeeping duties if there is no one else in the household capable of performing these tasks.</p>	<p><b>Homemaker Services.</b> Assistance to the participant with laundry, essential errands, meal preparation, and other light housekeeping duties if there is no one else in the household capable of performing these tasks.</p>
<p><b>Psychiatric Consultation.</b> Psychiatric Consultation is direct consultation and clinical evaluation of participants, who are currently experiencing or may be expected to experience a psychological, behavioral, or emotional crisis. This service may provide training to the direct service provider or participant's family related to the needs of a participant. These services also provide emergency intervention involving the direct support of the participant in crisis.</p>	<p><b>N/A/ - service will be removed as it was not used.</b></p>

<p><b>Nursing</b> Nursing services are those intermittent nursing services or private duty nursing services which provide individual and continuous care listed in the plan of service which are within the scope of the Nurse Practice Act and are provided by a licensed professional (RN) nurse or licensed practical nurse (LPN) under the supervision of an RN, licensed to practice in Idaho</p>	<p><b>Skilled Nursing Services.</b> Intermittent or continuous oversight, training, or skilled care which is within the scope of the Nurse Practice Act and as such care must be provided by a licensed registered nurse, or licensed practical nurse under the supervision of a registered nurse, licensed to practice in Idaho. Nursing services may include but are not limited to:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>a. The insertion and maintenance of nasogastric tubes and the monitoring or installation of feeding material;</li> <li>b.
