History of SYSTEM CHANGES for Adults with Developmental Disabilities

1970-First Private Intermediate Care Facility (ICF/ID) in Idaho.

1983-First Private Developmental Disability Center in Idaho

1990-Personal Care Services (PCS) first implemented

1994- Idaho Implements "Bridges to the Future" Community Supports Program

1995- Home and Community Based Services (HCBS) Waivers for Adults moving from Idaho State School and Hospital (ISSH Waiver)

1996- Idaho closes all State Adult Developmental Disability Centers and transfers all developmental therapy services for adults to the private sector

1990's- Home and Community Based Services Waiver for Aged and Disabled (A&D Waiver).

1999- Cap on HCBS Waiver is lifted

2000- Utilization Management Program (UMP) implemented for Waiver Services

2003-Care Management Required for State Plan Adult Services

2000's-Health and Welfare combines DD and ISSH Waiver into one DD Waiver

2007-Self Direction Waiver for Adults with Developmental Disabilities

1996 3% increase in community Medicaid rates

1999-Legislature approves funding for home and community based developmental therapy (two years after the rules are implemented)

1999 2.5% increase in community Medicaid rate

2002-Rates for Targeted Service Coordination and Residential Habilitation cut

2005-HB190 Passed requiring a rate methodology for community based services

2006 - 1.9% increase in community Medicaid rates

2010-2012, Lawsuits related to reimbursement rates and participant individual budget cuts by service coordination agencies, res hab agencies, families and individuals

2009-Developmental therapy hours weekly cap decreased from 30 to 22 hrs/wk

2010-HB701 Passes Legislature (Supportive Counseling eliminated, Collateral Contact eliminated, Plan Developmental Hours decreased from 12 to 6 hrs/yr, Evaluation Hours decreased from 12 to 6 hrs/yr adults with dual diagnosis required to choose system of support)

2010 H&W contracts with AMR to provide statewide transportation brokerage services

2011-HB260 Passes Legislature (creates blended rate for developmental therapy, requires Health and Welfare to move to budget tiers for adults, moves all of HB701 into law)

2012-HB609 Passes Legislature (restores services to individuals with dual diagnosis, removes language about budget tiers, and restores preventative dental care for adults on the Developmental Disability and Aged and Disable Waivers)

2012-Health and Welfare enters selective contract for Program Coordination Services for CFH Providers on the DD Waiver
