Who are Home and Community-Based Services (HCBS) Direct Care Workers?

Direct Care Workers do many things, like support people with:

- Getting around their home or community
- Building strong relationships
- Completing household tasks
- Working in their community
- Communicating with others
- Personal care and hygiene
- Taking medications
- Preparing Meals
- And so much more!

- Job Coach
- Personal Care Assistant
- Direct Support Professional
- Community Support Worker
- Paraprofessional



Medicaid HCBS direct care workers provide critical hands-on care and support to children & adults with disabilities and seniors to live, work, volunteer, and stay independent in their homes and communities.

The current HCBS direct care workforce in Idaho is in crisis due to an extreme worker shortage.

Pay is the biggest factor for direct care workers leaving the job

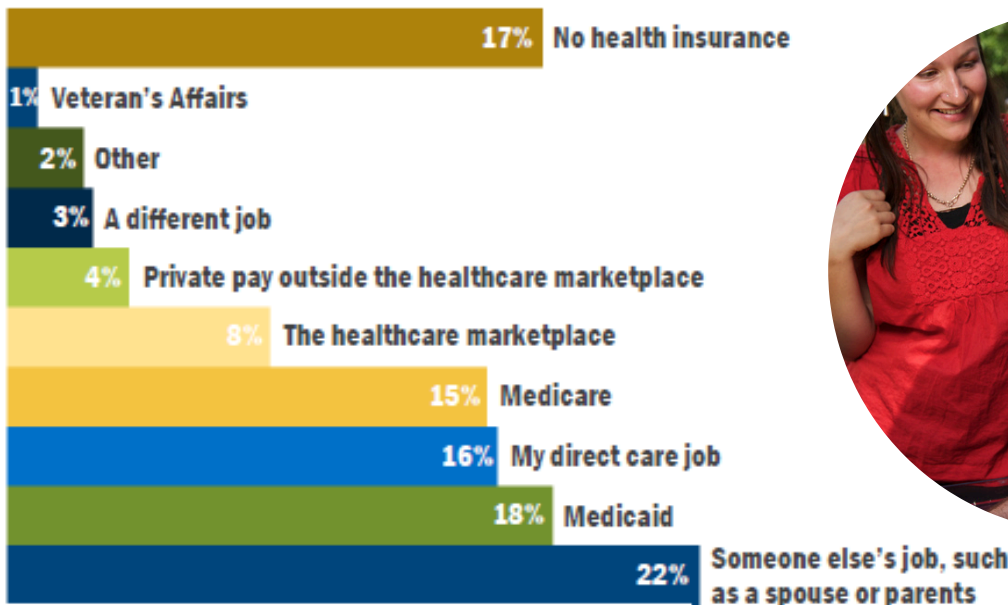
